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Introduction

This document is a key resource for understanding education trends, informing policy decisions, and assessing the impact of educational initiatives. However, it is important to recognize that the data presented represents a snapshot of the education system at a specific point in time. For instance, enrollment figures and staffing data are recorded at the start of the academic year and may not reflect mid-year changes, such as student transfers, dropouts, or staff turnover. Additionally, population data provided by the Statistical Office are preliminary figures, which will be updated in subsequent editions once revised estimates from the recently conducted census are made available. While the digest offers valuable insights into key education indicators, it may not fully capture the dynamic nature of the school year.

The Education Statistical Digest aims to provide a broad overview of educational trends, resource allocation, and performance indicators across various education levels. It covers student enrollment, performance metrics, assessment outcomes, financing trends, and staffing data—each contributing to identifying areas for improvement, evaluating policy effectiveness, and supporting strategic decision-making. The 2023-24 edition continues to emphasize equity in education by offering disaggregated data by gender, education level, and district. This approach facilitates a better understanding of educational disparities and achievements across different demographic groups.

Message from the Chief Education Officer – Mrs. Kay Martin-Jack



Definitions for Selected Indicators for Monitoring of the Education Sector

ACCESS AND PARTICIPATION INDICATORS

Net Enrolment Ratio in Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE)

Total number of children enrolled in early childhood care and education programs, 0-2 and 3-4, expressed as a percentage of the population of the using the corresponding cohorts. This indicator measures the general level of participation of young children in ECCE programs. It also indicates a country's capacity to prepare young children for primary education.

Gross Intake Ratio (GIR) in the First Grade of Primary Education

Total number of new entrants in the first grade of primary education, regardless of age, expressed as a percentage of the population at the official primary school-entrance age. This indicates the general level of access to primary education. It also indicates the capacity of the education system to provide access to Kindergarten for the official school-entrance age population.

Net Intake Rate (NIR) in the First Grade of Primary Education

New entrants in the first grade of primary education that are of the official primary school-entrance age, expressed as a percentage of the population of the same age. It is the norm that some students may enter the primary system just prior to their 5th birthday.

Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER)

Total enrolment in a specific level of education, regardless of age, expressed as a percentage of the eligible official school-age population corresponding to the same level of education in a given school year. The GER shows the general level of participation in a given level of education. It indicates the capacity of the education system to enroll students of a particular age group. It can also be a complementary indicator to net enrolment rate (NER) by indicating the extent of overaged and under-aged enrolment.

Net Enrolment Rate (NER)

This refers to the enrolment of the official age group for a given level of education expressed as a percentage of the corresponding population of the official age group. The NER reflects the extent of coverage in a given level of education of children and youths belonging to the official age group corresponding to the given level of education.

Age Specific Enrolment Rate (ASER)

Enrolment of a specific single age enrolled, irrespective of the level of education, as a percentage of the population of the same age. It is the extent of the educational participation of a specific age cohort.

Percentage of Private Enrolment

Enrolment in private educational institutions at a given level of education expressed as a percentage of total enrolment at the same level. The measure provides the relative weight of private education in terms of enrolment, hence the scale and capacity of private education within a country.

INTERNAL EFFICIENCY INDICATORS

Promotion Rate by Grade

Proportion of pupils from a cohort enrolled in a specific grade of a given school year who study in the next grade in the following school year. Promotion measures the performance of the education system in advancing pupils from a cohort from grade to grade, and its effect on the internal efficiency of educational systems. It is also a key indicator for analyzing and projecting pupil flows from grade to grade within the educational cycle.

Repetition Rate by Grade (RR)

Proportion of pupils from a cohort enrolled in a specific grade at a given school year who remain in the same grade in the following school year. Repetition shows the rate at which pupils from a cohort repeat a grade, and its effect on the internal efficiency of educational systems. In addition, it is one of the key indicators for analyzing and projecting pupil flows from grade to grade within the educational cycle.

Dropout Rate by Grade (DR)

Proportion of pupils from a cohort enrolled in a given grade at a given school year who are no longer enrolled in the following school year. Premature exiting measures the phenomenon of pupils from a cohort leaving school without completion, and its effect on the internal efficiency of educational systems. In addition, it is one of the key indicators for analyzing and projecting pupil flows from grade to grade within the educational cycle.

Transition Rate (TR)

The number of students admitted to the first grade of a higher level of education in a given year, expressed as a percentage of the number of students enrolled in the final grade of the lower level of education in the previous year. Transitioning to a higher cycle conveys information on the degree of access or transition from one cycle or level of education to a higher one. Viewed from the lower cycle or level of education, it is considered as an output indicator, viewed from the higher educational cycle or level, it constitutes an indicator of access. It can also help in assessing the relative selectivity of an education system, which can be due to pedagogical or financial requirements.

Pupil-Teacher Ratio (PTR)

This is the average number of pupils per teacher at a specific level of education in a given school year. To measure the level of human resources input in terms of the number of teachers in relation to the size of the pupil population. The results can be compared with established national norms on the number of pupils per teacher for each level or type of education.

Percentage of Trained Teachers

Number of teachers who have received the minimum organized teacher training (pre-service or inservice) required for teaching at the specified level of education in the given country, expressed as a percentage of the total number of teachers at the same level of education. This measures the proportion of teachers trained in pedagogical skills, according to national standards, to effectively teach and use the available instructional materials. It reveals also a country's commitment to invest in the development of its human capital involved in teaching activities.

Out-of-School Children

Children in the official primary school age range who are not enrolled in either primary or secondary schools. To identify the size of the population in the official primary school age range who should be targeted for policies and efforts in achieving universal primary education.

FINANCING INDICATORS

Public Expenditure on Education as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Product

Total public expenditure on education (current and capital) expressed as a percentage of the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in a given financial year. This indicator shows the proportion of a country's domestic production generated during a given financial year that has been spent by government authorities on education.

Public Expenditure on Education as a Percentage of Total Government Expenditure

Total public expenditure on education (current and capital) expressed as a percentage of total government expenditure in a given financial year. It shows a government's policy emphasis on education relative to the perceived value of other public investments. It reflects also the commitment of a government to invest in human capital development.

Percentage Distribution of Public Current Expenditure on Education by Level

Public current expenditure for each level of education, expressed as a percentage of total public current expenditure on education. The measure shows how financial resources for

education have been distributed across the different levels or stages of education. It measures the relative emphasis of government spending on a particular level of education within the overall educational expenditure.

Public Current Expenditure per Pupil as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Production per Capita

Public current expenditure per pupil at each level of education, expressed as a percentage of GDP per capita in a given financial year. This is the share of per capita income spent on each pupil. It helps in assessing a country's level of investment in human capital development. When calculated by level of education, it also indicates the relative costs and emphasis placed by the country on a particular level of education.

Educational Attainment of the Population Aged 15-24 Years and Above

The percentage distribution of population aged 15-24 years and above according to the highest level of education attained or completed with reference to ISCED. To show the educational composition of the population aged 15-24 years and above, hence the stock and quality of human capital within a country, so as to gauge needs and establish policies for upgrading it. This indicator also reflects the structure and performance of the education system and its accumulated impact on human capital formation.

Percentage Distribution of Enrolment in Secondary Education by Type of Education Program

Percentage distribution of students enrolled in secondary education, according to the orientation of the education program, i.e. general and vocational/technical education, including teacher training. To reflect the orientation and capacity of secondary education programs as well as the potential supply of skilled workers in different specializations.

Gross Primary Graduation Ratio (GPGR)

Total number of graduates from the last grade of primary education, regardless of age, expressed as a percentage of the population at the theoretical graduation age for primary. It is an indication of the general level of primary education graduation. This proxy measure of primary completion reports the current primary outputs stemming from previous years of schooling and past education policies on entrance to primary education. It also indicates the capacity of the education system to provide primary graduation for the theoretical graduation age population.

Gender Parity Index (GPI)

The ratio of female to male values of a given indicator. The GPI measures progress towards gender parity in education participation and/or learning opportunities available for women in relation to those available to men. It also reflects the level of women's empowerment in society.

Youth Literacy Rate

The number of persons aged 15 to 24 years who can both read and write with understanding a short simple statement on their everyday life, divided by the population in that age group. Generally, 'literacy' also encompasses 'numeracy', the ability to make simple arithmetic calculations. The literacy rate reflects recent outcomes of the basic education process. It is a summary measure of the effectiveness of the education system.

Early Childhood Education


This section of the Education Statistical Digest provides an overview of Early Childhood Education (ECE) in St. Vincent and The Grenadines. ECE refers to the care and education of children from birth to around eight years old. According to the International Standard Classification of Education (ISCED) 2011, within ISCED 0, early childhood development programs target children aged 0 to 2 years, while pre-primary education programs cater to children aged 3 years up to the age for starting ISCED 1.


The data provided covers the academic years from 2012/13 to 2023/24 in some cases. It is important to note that the data reflects only the institutions that completed the Annual School Questionnaire at the time of publication, which may not represent the full set of institutions or their most current data.


As of the 2023/24 academic year, 2,939 students were enrolled in 95 early childhood education centers across St. Vincent and the Grenadines. Of these, 1,479 (50.32%) were male, and 1,460 (49.68%) were female. Of the total student enrollment, 1,001 (34%) were aged 0 to 2 years, typically referred to as daycare, while the remaining 1,938 (66%) were aged 3 to 4+ years, classified as preschool (pre-primary) attendees.

A total of 365 early childhood practitioners staff the 95 centers. Among these centers, 15 are government-owned and operated, providing access to 424 students, which accounts for approximately 14% of the total enrollment. The remaining 80 centers, which are privately operated, cater to 2,515 students, or 86% of the total ECE enrollment.

The government of St. Vincent and The Grenadines remains committed to enhancing the quality of early childhood education, recognizing its foundational role in shaping the future of children. This commitment is demonstrated through substantial financial support, as reflected in the budgetary allocation of \$56,106,812 specifically programmed for pre-primary and primary education. This investment underscores the government's dedication to improving access to and the quality of early childhood education, ensuring that all children, regardless of their background, have the opportunity to benefit from a strong educational foundation.














The number of centres responding to the annual school questionnaire declined from 125 in 2012/13 to 95 in 2023/24, with a peak of 130 centres in 2013/14. Enrollment figures showed fluctuations, generally trending downward, with the highest enrollment of 4,263 children in 2012/13 and the lowest of 2,773 children in 2021/22. The number of caregivers also fluctuated, peaking at 540 in 2018/19 and falling to 365 in 2023/24. The average centre size, calculated by dividing enrollment by the number of centres, decreased from 34 in 2012/13 to a stable range of 29–31 in recent years. The child/caregiver ratio fluctuated between 7 and 10, reaching its highest in 2012/13 (10) and its lowest in 2014/15, 2015/16 and 2018/19 (7). By 2023/24, the ratio 8, suggests more personalized attention for each child from a ratio of 10 in 2012/13, this may enhance the quality of education and care.





Total enrollment has decreased significantly from 4,263 in 2012/13 to 2,939 in 2023/24, a reduction of approximately 31%. The most notable declines occurred between 2012/13 and 2013/14, as well as between 2019/20 and 2020/21. The latter decline is likely attributed to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on preschool attendance. Throughout this period, male enrollment generally outnumbered female enrollment, with an average difference of about 50 students per year. This decline may reflect broader demographic trends, such as decreasing birth rates and shifts in population distribution. The decline in enrollment underscores the need to evaluate preschool capacity and resource allocation. If this trend persists, increasing the number of public Early Childhood Centres, consolidating preschool centers or revising outreach strategies may be necessary to boost participation.





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




Observations:




Observations:

District 7 has the highest enrollment with 1,009 students, followed by District 6 with 440 students and District 2 with 262 students. Districts 8, 5, and 3 have moderate enrollments, with 215, 173, and 148 students, respectively. District 13 has the lowest enrollment at 54 students, followed by District 4 with 75 students.



Observations:

District 7 has the highest number of preschool centers, with 23, while District 9 has the fewest, with only 2 centers. Districts 6 (12 centers) and 8 (10 centers) also have relatively high numbers of centers. Districts 11 (8 centers), 3, and 5 (7 centers each) fall in the middle range, while Districts 12 and 13 each have 3 centers. Districts 1, 4, and 10 have between 4 and 5 centers. There is a strong correlation between the number of preschool centers and enrollment, as District 7, with the most centers, also has the highest enrollment. However, some districts, such as District 8, show relatively low enrollment despite having several centers. Similarly, Districts 12 and 13 have low enrollment despite having preschool centers, suggesting factors such as lower population density, accessibility issues, or socio-economic challenges.



Observations:

District 9 has the highest average enrollment per preschool center, with 66 students per center, despite having only two centers. Districts 2 and 7 each have an average of 44 students per center, while District 12 shows a relatively high average of 37 students per center. In contrast, Districts 1 and 11 have the lowest average enrollment, with 16 students per center.

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

Child/Caregiver Ratios:

- Represents the average number of children assigned to one caregiver.
 - Varies across districts and years.

Average Ratios: Averages for all districts are summarized at the bottom for each year.

Variation Across Districts:

o Districts like North of Overland (District 1), Langley Park, Georgetown and Dickson (District 3) and Kingstown show consistently lower child/caregiver ratios, indicating potentially smaller class sizes or better staffing. o Conversely, districts such as Layou (District 9) and Barrouallie to Spring (District 10) show consistently higher ratios, suggesting a higher workload for caregivers in these areas.

Changes Over Time:

o Ratios generally decrease over time in most districts, reflecting potential improvements in caregiver availability or enrollment patterns. For instance:

District 1, the ratio drops from 10 in 2012/13 to 5 in 2023/24.

o The average child/caregiver ratio shows an overall decline from 11 in 2012/13 to 8 in 2023/24, indicating a general improvement in the distribution of caregivers.

District-Specific Observations:

- o Some districts, like Kingstown (District 7), exhibit consistent ratios (mostly 7 children per caregiver), suggesting stable enrollment and staffing conditions.
- o Northern Grenadines (District 12) shows a significant improvement, dropping from 15 to 9 over the years. o Disparities: The ratios indicate notable disparities between districts. For example, in 2023/24: District 1 has a ratio of 5, while District 9 has a ratio of 15.
- o The decrease in average ratios suggests successful efforts to recruit caregivers or manage enrollment in recent years.
 - o The overall decline in average ratios suggests that policies aimed at improving early childhood education resources may have been effective.
 - o Persistent disparities, however, point to the need for localized strategies.
- o Since the data includes only institutions completing the questionnaire, it may not fully represent the state of early childhood education across all districts.

Primary Education

This segment of the Education Statistical Digest presents data and insights on primary education in St. Vincent and the Grenadines. According to the International Standard Classification of Education (ISCED) by UNESCO, primary education (ISCED Level 1) is designed to equip students with fundamental skills in reading, writing, and mathematics, laying a crucial foundation for further learning and comprehension in key areas of knowledge.


For the 2023-24 academic year, 64 out of 67 institutions offering primary education in St. Vincent and the Grenadines provided the requested data at the time of publication. A total of 11,481 students were enrolled across these institutions, with a nearly equal distribution between males and females: 5,840 boys (approximately 50.87%) and 5,641 girls (around 49.13%).


The majority of primary education students (10,112) are enrolled in government-owned or public schools, which account for 57 of the 67 primary institutions. Meanwhile, 1,369 students are enrolled in private or government-assisted schools, which constitute 10 institutions.

The dropout rate at the primary level remains impressively low, with fewer than 1% of students leaving before completing their education. Similarly, the proportion of students repeating a grade is relatively low, with just over 1% (128 students) recorded as repeaters. It is worth noting that males represent a disproportionately higher share of repeaters compared to females at every grade level, except in Grades 1 and 6.

In terms of staffing, the primary schools employ 1,018 teachers. Of these, 118 (around 11.59%) are male, and 900 (approximately 88.41%) are female. Notably, over 75% of the teaching staff (777 teachers) have undergone formal pedagogical training, equipping them with the necessary skills to deliver quality education.

The government continues to demonstrate its commitment to primary education by allocating a budget of \$56,106,812 specifically for pre-primary and primary education. In addition, the government is increasing opportunities for both pre-service and in-service teacher training, ensuring that educators possess the requisite pedagogical and professional knowledge to effectively teach and meet the evolving needs of students.








Early Education

The high number of repeaters in Grade K suggests that early education may face challenges, particularly for male students, in terms of readiness or transition to formal schooling.

Gender Distribution of Repeaters

Males account for a significantly higher proportion of repeaters compared to females in every grade level except for Grades 1 and 6.

Male-to-Female Repeater Ratio: In total, for every female repeater, there are approximately 1.91 male repeaters.

In Grade K, the disparity is the most significant, with 38 male repeaters compared to 15 female repeaters, highlighting the larger gap in early education.

Grade 6 is the exception, where there are no female repeaters. This could indicate that fewer female students are being held back at this level.

Grade-Specific Trends

In Grade 5 (G5) there is a notable difference between male (13) and female (5) repeaters. This could imply that Grade 5 is a particularly challenging year for male students.

Grade K (kindergarten) has a considerable number of repeaters (53 total). This could be a sign that students in the early years face difficulties transitioning, either due to age, developmental challenges, or readiness for formal education.

Grade 6, with only 1 male repeater and no female repeaters, indicates that most students make it to the end of the primary level, possibly due to additional support as they prepare for CPEA or fewer challenges at this stage.





Figure 14 illustrates the Repetition Rates by Gender and Year from 2011/12 to 2023/24. The lines represent the rates for Males (blue), Females (orange), and the Total (grey), expressed as percentages.

Description

1. General Trends:

o There is a downward trend in repetition rates for all categories (Male, Female, Total) over the 13-year period. o Rates start higher in 2011/12 and gradually decrease, reaching their lowest points around 2020/21.

2. Male and Female Rates:

 $o\ \textit{Male repetition rates are consistently higher than female rates across all years.}$

o The gap between male and female rates narrows slightly over time but remains present.

3. Total Repetition Rate:

o The total repetition rate follows a pattern between the male and female lines, reflecting the weighted contribution of both genders.

4. Notable Features:

o A sharp decline is visible from 2011/12 to 2013/14.

o After a period of relative stability, there is a minor increase in repetition rates for all categories in 2021/22. o From 2021/22 onward, rates decline again, with 2023/24 showing some of the lowest values.

Discussion

1. Steady Decline:

o The consistent decrease in repetition rates over the years suggests improvements in education systems, student performance, or policy changes (e.g., better teaching methods or intervention programs).

2. Gender Differences:

o The consistently higher rates for males may indicate disparities in learning challenges or engagement between genders. It could reflect differences in social or educational support structures.

3. 2021/22 Spike:

o The increase in repetition rates during 2021/22 might correlate with external disruptions, such as the volcanic eruptions and COVID-19 pandemic, which could have impacted education continuity and student performance.

4. Low Rates in 2023/24:

o The decline to near-historic lows in 2023/24 is encouraging, suggesting ongoing improvements.

Analysis

1. Male Repetition Rate:

o Males exhibit the steepest decline in the earlier years, suggesting early interventions were particularly effective for this group, for example, targeted policy changes, improvements in the school environment (addressing broader issues like discipline, attendance, or classroom dynamics that disproportionately affected boys), and better identification of learning challenges.

 $o\ However,\ their\ consistently\ higher\ rates\ highlight\ a\ need\ for\ gender-specific\ strategies\ to\ close\ the\ gap.$

2. Female Repetition Rate:

o Females show more stability with a less pronounced gap between peaks and troughs.

o The relatively lower rates might suggest better engagement or fewer barriers to success for female students.

3. Volcanic Eruptions and COVID-19 Impact (2021/22):

o The spike in 2021/22 could serve as a marker for the volcanic eruptions and pandemic's long-term effects on student outcomes, such as learning loss or interruptions.

o A general decline is observed in the total number of repeaters over the years, from 677 in 2011/12 to 128 in 2023/24. o Significant drops are noticeable between certain years, such as from 2012/13 (605) to 2013/14 (352) and again from 2019/20 (200) to 2020/21 (121).

o Male repeaters followed a similar trend, decreasing from 430 in 2011/12 to 84 in 2023/24. These figures represent the highest and lowest recorded numbers of male repeaters within the 2011/12 to 2023/24 period, with some fluctuations observed in between o Female repeaters follow a similar declining trend as total repeaters, dropping from 247 in 2011/12 to 44 in 2023/24.

O The lowest number of female repeaters (36) is recorded in 2020/21.

o The percentage fluctuates, with notable peaks in:

- 2012/13: 38.68%

- 2016/17: 37.40%

- 2019/20: 42.00% (the highest recorded percentage)

o Declines occur in years such as:

- 2017/18: 30.51% (the lowest recorded percentage)

- 2020/21: 29.75%

o By 2023/24, the percentage rises again to 34.38%, showing stabilization near the earlier values.

o Female repeaters consistently form a significant minority of repeaters at the primary school level, with their share ranging from 29.75% to 42.00% over the years. While their proportion fluctuates, the trend indicates that female repeaters generally account for about one-third of all repeaters, with occasional increases to higher percentages in specific years, such as 2019/20 (42.00%). Despite this, male repeaters consistently represent the majority of repeaters across all years.





o District 12 has the second highest repetition rate (2.07 %)

o District 1 has the lowest repetition rate at 0.23%, suggesting fewer challenges related to student retention in this district.

In District 2 (Dickson Methodist), boys constitute 62.50% of the enrolment. In District 1 (Fancy Government), boys make up 62.07% of the enrolment.

For District 1, Fancy Government has the smallest average class sizes across both grade groups (9 for K–G2 and 8 for G3–G6). Its overall average class size for K–6 is 8, significantly smaller than the district average.

District 5 has a total enrolment of 748 students across 47 classes, with an overall average class size of 16. General Decline: There is a clear decline in overall enrolment over the years.

- In 2005/06, the total enrolment was 16,063.
- By 2023/24, the total enrolment decreased to 11,481.
- This represents a drop of 4,582 students (a 28.5% decline).
- The overall drop in total enrolment may indicate factors such as declining birth rates, migration, or lower school attendance rates. It also highlights potential demographic shifts that require further investigation.

Kindergarten:

The table provides a breakdown of enrolment data for private/ assisted primary schools for the academic year 2023/24. A total of 1,369 students are enrolled across 10 schools, with 713 females and 656 males, indicating that females outnumber males by 57 students overall. The data is categorized by school, grade level (K to G6), and gender, providing a clear snapshot of enrolment trends.

St. Mary's Roman Catholic School stands out as the largest institution, enrolling 629 students, with females (368) significantly outnumbering males (261). 

Overall Enrollment Trends

- There has been a consistent decline in total enrollment over the years, from 15,747 in 2006/07 to 11,481 in 2023/24 (a decrease of about 27.3%).
- The most significant drop in total enrollment occurred between 2009/10 and 2010/11, with a decrease of 1,171 students. The decline has continued, albeit at a slower pace, in the years following.
- 2023/24 is the year with the lowest total enrollment (11,481), indicating a long-term trend of declining enrollment numbers.

Gender Distribution

- Male enrollment has consistently been higher than female enrollment across all years.
- Male enrollment peaked in 2006/07 at 8,161 students and has gradually decreased to 5,840 in 2023/24 (a decline of about 28.5%).
 - Female enrollment peaked in 2006/07 at 7,586 students and has also gradually decreased to 5,641 in 2023/24 (a decline of about 25.6%).
- The gender gap in enrollment has remained relatively stable, with males consistently representing about 55% to 58% of the total enrollment and females about 42% to 45%.

Grade-wise Enrollment Trends

- Kindergarten enrollment (K) has shown notable fluctuations, with a general decrease from 2,030 in 2006/07 to 1,525 in 2023/24, indicating reduced early-childhood school participation.
- Grade 1 enrollment has followed a similar downward trend, decreasing from 2,178 in 2006/07 to 1,528 in 2023/24.

Year-to-Year Changes

- The number of students enrolled in Grade 4, 5, and 6 showed a steady decrease starting in 2006/07, with fluctuations between years (e.g., Grade 4 saw a drop from 2,292 in 2006/07 to 1,797 in 2023/24).
- For some years, enrollment in Grade 2 and Grade 3 fluctuated considerably, with smaller numbers of students in some years (e.g., 2008/09 saw an increase in Grade 2 enrollment, while Grade 3 had a sudden dip in 2010/11).

Impact of Missing Data

• Three schools did not submit data for the academic year 2023/24, which may affect the accuracy of the totals for that year. This missing data might contribute to the slightly lower enrollment numbers for the 2023/24 school year compared to the previous years, although the general trend of declining enrollment is still evident.

Impact of Specific Years

• The largest decline in enrollment was observed in 2009/10 to 2010/11, possibly due to external factors such as changes in population or migration affecting school attendance.

Regional Trends

• There are notable regional trends, such as the increase in enrollment in earlier years, especially in Grades 1 and 2, but a steady decline thereafter. This could reflect changes in demographic factors, migration patterns, or shifting parental priorities regarding education.

Concentration in Later Grades

• The lower numbers of students in the early grades (Kindergarten through Grade 2) in recent years suggest that fewer children are enrolling at the entry levels, which could be indicative of reduced birth rates or a change in school participation at younger ages.

Population Demographics

• Given the long-term trend of enrollment decline, there may be changes in the student population, such as a decrease in the number of children of primary school age, or changes in the socio-economic conditions that influence enrollment, such as migration.

The table presents data on the gross enrollment rates (GER) of children in primary classes, encompassing kindergarten and grades 1–6, for the academic years 2001/02 to 2023/24. The data highlights enrollment trends relative to the school-going population aged 5 to 11. Key variables include the total population in the age group, enrollment numbers for kindergarten and grades 1–6, total enrollment, and the GER, expressed as a percentage of the total population aged 5–11.

The total population aged 5–11 demonstrates a general decline over time. Starting at 16,027 in 2001/02, the population gradually decreased, reaching 16,623 in 2012/13 before experiencing a sharp drop to 12,644 in 2013/14. After this notable decrease, the population stabilized in the 12,000s for the remaining years, ending at 12,772 in 2023/24. This long-term downward trend reflects significant demographic shifts.

Enrollment figures for both kindergarten and grades 1–6 reveal a consistent decline over the years: Kindergarten enrollment peaked at 2,479 in 2001/02 but steadily dropped to 1,525 by 2023/24.

Grades 1–6 enrollment also decreased, from 16,890 in 2001/02 to 11,247 in 2023/24.

Total enrollment, combining kindergarten and grades 1–6, followed the same downward trajectory, falling from 19,369 in 2001/02 to 11,481 in 2023/24.

The GER, which reflects the ratio of total enrollment to the population aged 5–11, began at 120.85% in 2001/02 and generally declined over the years. The GER exceeded 100% in earlier years, likely due to the inclusion of overaged or underaged children in primary classes.

The GER saw a steady decline from 120.85% in 2001/02 to below 100% by 2008/09, dropping further into the 90s and 80s over subsequent years. Notably, in 2013/14, the GER increased to 106.19%, reflecting a temporary surge in total enrollment relative to the population. Afterward, the GER resumed its decline, reaching 89.89% in 2023/24.

Overall Grade Enrolment Ratio refers to the total number of students enrolled in a specific grade (regardless of whether they are younger, of the typical age, or older for that grade) as a proportion of the total population of children for the age typically associated with that grade.

In simpler terms, this ratio shows how many students, including those who are under-aged, at the normal age, or overaged for a given grade, are enrolled in that grade, compared to the total number of children who are of the age expected for that grade.

The total population of children expected at the corresponding age for each grade is compared to the overall enrolment ratio, which stands at 89.89%. This indicates that while a significant portion of the school-age population is enrolled, full inclusivity is not achieved. Age distribution reveals that 36.59% of students are underaged, 53.53% are age-appropriate, and 7.66% are overaged. In grade-level analysis, grades 3 and 4 have enrolment ratios exceeding 100%, likely due to early as well as late enrolments, grade repetition, or student migration. Grade 2 has the lowest enrolment ratio at 84.92%, highlighting a gap in enrolment. Grades 1 and 2 show stable enrolment ratios near 90%, though they have a higher proportion of underaged students, reflecting early enrolment trends.

Age Specific Enrolment Ratio refers to the proportion of children of a specific age who are enrolled in a particular grade or class, relative to the total population of children of that same age.

In other words, it shows how many children of a given age (e.g., age 6) are attending school at the level of education that corresponds to that age (e.g., first grade), compared to the total number of children of that age in the population.

The Age-Specific Enrolment Ratio across all grades is 50.11%, indicating that just over half of the age-appropriate population is enrolled, while nearly half is not. Females slightly outperform males in overall enrolment, with ratios of 50.27% and 49.96%, respectively. Grade 3 has the highest enrolment ratio at 57.75%, with similar participation from both genders (males 57.81%, females 57.70%). In contrast, Grade 6 has the lowest ratio at 41.95%, with males (39.93%) and females (44.21%) both underrepresented. Population data shows relatively balanced male and female numbers across age groups, such as in Kindergarten (1,767 total children) and Grade 6 (2,172 total children). 

The total enrolment across all schools in St. Vincent and the Grenadines in 2023/24 is 11,481 students, comprising 5,840 males and 5,641 females, and includes both public and assisted schools. Public schools account for the majority, 88.08%, with 10,112 students (5,184 males and 4,928 females), while assisted schools enroll 11.92% with 1,369 students (656 males and 713 females).

The graph (Figure 19) depicts the percentage share of male and female teachers in primary schools over the academic years 2001/02 to 2023/24. The x-axis represents the academic years, and the y-axis reflects the percentage of teachers, ranging from 0% to 100%. The data reveals two distinct trends: an upward trajectory for female teachers and a downward one for male teachers.

Female Teachers: The percentage of female teachers in primary schools begins at 70.67% in 2001/02 and steadily increases over the following years, reaching nearly 90% by 2023/24. This trend highlights a consistent and significant rise in the proportion of female teachers within primary education, with a particularly sharp increase post-2009/10.

Male Teachers: In contrast, the percentage of male teachers starts at 29.33% in 2001/02 and decreases gradually, approaching just 10% by 2023/24. This decline is evident across the years, with a slight anomaly around 2009/10, where the decrease appears to plateau momentarily before resuming its downward trajectory.

Despite the anomaly around 2009/10, the overall trends indicate a male teacher shortage and an increasingly female-dominated workforce in primary education. This shift could be attributed to various factors such as societal changes, teaching as a female-dominated profession, or fewer males entering the field of education.

A predominantly female teaching workforce offers several advantages:

- Role Modeling: Female teachers serve as valuable role models for young girls, demonstrating that women can excel in positions of authority and leadership. This can inspire young girls to pursue education and leadership roles,

fostering confidence in their potential for professional success.

- Gender Sensitivity: Female educators are often more attuned to gender-related issues, which can create a more inclusive classroom environment. Their awareness of discrimination or gender bias can lead to greater efforts to address these challenges, benefiting both female and male students.

- Supportive Environment: A female-majority teaching workforce may foster a nurturing and inclusive learning environment, which can contribute to a more supportive and empathetic atmosphere for students, particularly girls.

However, the underrepresentation of male teachers in primary education brings about certain drawbacks:

- Lack of Male Role Models: The scarcity of male teachers reduces the availability of positive male role models for students, particularly boys. Boys may miss the opportunity to observe males in nurturing and educational roles, which could affect their social development and views on masculinity.

- Reinforcement of Gender Stereotypes: The overwhelming presence of female teachers in primary schools may reinforce the stereotype that teaching and caregiving are roles primarily for women. This could limit students' understanding of gender equality and potentially perpetuate outdated gender norms.

- Limited Perspective on Gender Roles: A lack of male representation may hinder students' broader understanding of gender equality, as they might begin to associate certain professions with a specific gender. This lack of diversity in professional representation could restrict students' ability to perceive gender roles in a more balanced and inclusive light.



The pupil/teacher ratios across district primary schools for the academic year 2023/24 exhibit a relatively consistent distribution, with most districts maintaining ratios between 10 and 12. Districts 4 and 7 stand out as exceptions to this trend.

District 4 has the lowest pupil/teacher ratio at 8, which is highlighted by the orange bar in the chart. This lower ratio suggests a smaller student population relative to the number of teachers, potentially allowing for more individualized attention for students. Conversely, District 7 has the highest ratio at 13, as represented by the green bar. This higher ratio indicates a larger number of students per teacher.

The majority of districts, represented by blue bars, maintain a ratio of around 11, reflecting relative uniformity across the region. Another notable exception is District 12, with a below-average ratio of 9, similar to District 4, attributable to a smaller student body combined with a comparatively large number of teachers.



The distribution of trained teachers varies significantly across the 13 education districts. Out of these, 5 districts report a percentage of trained teachers over 80%. The specific district with the highest proportion of trained teachers is District 4, where 88.14% of the 59 teachers are certified and trained.

On the other end of the spectrum, District 13 has the lowest percentage of trained teachers, with only 51.72% of the 29 teachers holding formal teaching qualifications. It is important to note that data is missing for Stephanie Browne Primary School in District 13. As a result, the reported figures for the district are somewhat underrepresented. The actual percentage of trained teachers in District 13 would likely be slightly higher once the missing data is included.




Total expenditure on education has risen from EC\$29.29 million in 2002/03 to EC\$56.11 million in 2023/24. This increase is largely driven by a steady rise in unit expenditure per pupil, which has grown from EC\$1,573 in 2002/03 to EC\$4,887 in 2023/24, more than tripling over the period. On average, unit expenditure has increased by approximately 4–6% annually. The significant rise in unit expenditure is likely attributed to factors such as inflation, higher educational costs, improved standards and potential changes in funding allocation policies.







- The number of male candidates has generally been higher than female candidates, with a difference of 10-50 candidates each year; for instance, in 2024, there were 868 male candidates and 869 female candidates, indicating nearly equal gender distribution.
- Overall, pass rates have shown an increase, rising from 78.08% in 2014 to 87.68% in 2024, reflecting a positive trend in candidate success.
- Male pass rates have improved from 69.67% in 2014 to 84.10% in 2024, although still trailing behind female pass rates, the gap has narrowed significantly over time.
- Female candidates consistently outperform males, with pass rates remaining high, peaking at 93.92% in 2019 and staying above 90% since 2017, until slightly decreasing to 89.72% in 2022.
- The gap between male and female pass rates, which ranged from 8-15 percentage points, has narrowed from 17.83 percentage points in 2014 to 7.15 percentage points in 2024.




Table 67: The Percentage Pass Rate of Pupils by Subject and Gender in the Caribbean Primary Exit

Table 67 provides a year-by-year analysis of pupil performance in the Caribbean Primary Exit Assessment (CPEA) examinations across four subjects: Language, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies, from 2014 to 2024. The data is categorized by gender (male and female) and reports the number of sitting candidates, passes, and percentage pass rates for each gender and overall.

Science consistently achieves high pass rates, with averages often exceeding 70% and, on occasion, surpassing 80%. Despite this, it does not always hold the highest pass rates across all years or demographics, as Language occasionally outperforms it. In general, the performance in Science has remained stable with only minor fluctuations, solidifying it as one of the stronger subjects in terms of student outcomes. Mathematics, on the other hand, consistently shows the lowest pass rates among the subjects. Year after year, the pass rates for Mathematics frequently dip below 50%, and in 2021, the pass rate was as low as 31.73%. This trend highlights Mathematics as the most challenging subject for students, with performance often lagging behind other subjects.

Language and Social Studies display more moderate and relatively stable pass rates. These subjects generally fall between the performance of Science and Mathematics. Although the pass rates in both subjects are solid, they do not demonstrate the same high level of consistency as Science or the significant challenges seen in Mathematics.

When analyzing performance by gender, females consistently outperform males across all subjects and years, with a few exceptions. Notably, in Mathematics in 2024, males (51.96%) slightly surpassed females (51.78%) in their pass rates, but this is an anomaly in an otherwise consistent pattern of female dominance in academic performance. In Social Studies, for example, females achieved a pass rate of 74.22% in 2024, while males recorded 67.51%. Similarly, in 2018, females scored 59.78% in Mathematics, compared to 53.76% for males. The performance gap between genders is most pronounced in Language and Science, where females tend to achieve significantly higher pass rates—often by margins of 7 to 12 percentage points. While the gender disparity in performance is less pronounced in Mathematics, with females generally performing slightly better, it is still evident. Regarding Social Studies, the gender gap in performance is the smallest, but females still maintain an edge in performance.

Over the years, the number of candidates sitting the CPEA exams has fluctuated, ranging from 1,600 to 2,000. Despite these fluctuations, the trends in subject-specific pass rates have remained relatively stable, with Science showing the least variation. Overall, the data reveals that while students struggle most with Mathematics, Science continues to be a strength, with females outperforming males across nearly all subjects and years, except in a few isolated cases.

Table 68 presents data on the performance of students in primary schools across St. Vincent and the Grenadines in the 2024 Caribbean Primary Exit Assessment Examinations. Key metrics include the number of students sitting for the examination, the number of passes, and the pass rates, disaggregated by school and gender. Here's a breakdown of the findings:

Overview of Participation and Pass Rates

A total of 1,737 students participated in the examinations, with a nearly equal distribution of genders—869 females and 868 males. Female students constituted a slight majority at 50.02% of participants. Overall, the pass rate was 87.68%, with females significantly outperforming males. Female students achieved a pass rate of 91.25%, compared to 84.10% for their male counterparts. This consistent gender disparity suggests a need for targeted support to enhance male performance.

Performance by Schools

Several schools excelled in the assessments, achieving a 100% pass rate for both genders. Three (3) such schools are: Bequia Anglican Primary, Diamond Government, and Richland Park S.D.A. These results underscore the success of teaching strategies and resource utilization in these schools. Notably, Argyle Primary displayed a stark gender disparity, with females achieving a perfect 100% pass rate while males achieved 71.43%.

Colonarie Government was the only school which recorded an overall pass rate below 50 %, due to its low male pass rate of 40 %.

Gender differences were evident across some schools, with females typically outperforming males. For example, Belair Government and Layou Government and demonstrated this trend. However, there were instances where males outshone their female counterparts, such as Stephanie Browne Primary, where males achieved a 100% pass rate compared to 80% for females and Troumaca Government, where males achieved a 92.31 % pass rate compared to 71.43 % for females.

Trends and Observations

A notable trend was that schools with fewer participants, such as New Prospect Primary and Mayreau Government, generally achieved higher pass rates. This trend may stem from more focused attention and personalized teaching. However, exceptions exist where smaller enrollments did not lead to higher performance, suggesting the influence of additional factors like teacher quality, resource availability and student dedication.

Conversely, large schools such as Kingstown Preparatory maintained high pass rates despite larger enrollments, indicating effective teaching strategies and efficient resource management.

Special Needs Education

The Government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines recognizes the importance of providing access to education for all its citizens, including those with special educational needs. This commitment is reflected in the budgetary allocation of \$2,364,792 specifically designated for Special Education Services, aimed at ensuring both access to and quality education for students with special needs.

Special education is designed to support individuals who, for various reasons, require additional assistance and adaptive teaching methods to participate and meet the learning objectives of an educational program. These reasons may include, but are not limited to, physical, behavioral, intellectual, emotional, and social challenges. Special education programs often follow a curriculum similar to that of the regular education system, but they are tailored to meet the individual needs of students by providing specific resources, such as specially trained staff, specialized equipment, or modified learning content and objectives. These programs may be offered within the existing educational framework or as separate classes, either within the same institution or in a different setting altogether.

In St. Vincent and the Grenadines, three institutions provide educational access to students with special needs. For the 2023-24 academic year, a total of 98 students were enrolled across these institutions—66 males and 32 females. The institutions were staffed by 25 teachers, 12 of whom (approximately 48%) had formal in-service or pre-service pedagogical training, commonly referred to as "teacher training."

The Kingstown School for Children with Special Education Needs continues to serve the majority of students with special educational needs, with just over 58% (or 57 students) enrolled there. A contributing factor to this concentration may be the population density around the capital, Kingstown.

The Government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines continues to demonstrate a strong commitment to inclusive education by providing targeted resources and support for students with special educational needs. The allocation of funds and the establishment of specialized institutions reflect the country's dedication to ensuring that all children, regardless of their individual challenges, have access to quality education. While there is progress in providing specialized training for educators and ensuring educational access, continued efforts are needed to further enhance the reach and effectiveness of special education services. Increasing teacher training and expanding resources will be crucial to meet the evolving needs of students with special needs and to ensure that they can fully participate in educational programs alongside their peers.

The School for Children With Special Needs in Georgetown has maintained a relatively small student population, with enrollment fluctuating between 16 and 27 students annually. The peak years were 2017/18 and 2018/19, each accommodating 27 students. Learning Disabilities dominate the disability profile, with 99 cases reported over the years. However, other disabilities, such as Visual and Hearing Impairments, have also been significant, with 22 and 19 cases, respectively. Autism and Mental Challenges remain less common, with fewer than 20 cases each. Despite its small size, the school demonstrates a broad capacity to address diverse needs, although targeted resources may be necessary to address specific challenges like Autism.

As the largest of the three schools, the School for Children With Special Needs in Kingstown consistently supports the highest enrollment, peaking at 70 students in 2020/21. Over the ten (10) year period, Learning Disabilities (132 cases) and the category "Other" (108 cases) are the most prevalent. Significant numbers of students with Multiple Handicaps (100 cases) and Autism (99 cases) also highlight the school's extensive role in catering to diverse and complex needs. Despite fluctuations in enrollment and disability trends, the school serves as a cornerstone for special education in the area. The large enrollment underscores the importance of continuous investments in staff training, diagnostic tools, and support services.

The Sunshine School in Bequia has the lowest enrollment among the three schools, ranging from 20 to 32 students annually. Learning Disabilities are the most frequent condition, with 112 cases reported over the years, followed by Multiple Handicaps (63 cases). Autism and other disabilities have remained relatively low, while Visual Impairments are negligible. The school's low enrollment reflects the small population of Bequia and a corresponding limited number of children requiring special education services. However, shifts in the number of students with Learning Disabilities, peaking in 2019/20 and declining afterward, suggest the need for enhanced diagnostic efforts and possibly staff training to better address evolving needs.

Overall Trends and Observations

Across all three schools, Learning Disabilities consistently dominate the disability profiles, accounting for the largest share of cases. A rising awareness and improved diagnostic practices could explain the observed increase in these cases over time rather than a true increase in prevalence.

Policy Implications:

• Trends point to the need for sustained investment in staff training, early diagnosis programs, and improved facilities, especially for Autism and Multiple Handicaps.



The data in the table reveals trends in pupil enrollment, teacher numbers, and pupil/teacher ratios in Special Education Centres from 2015/16 to 2023/24. Over this nine-year period, enrollment figures have shown fluctuation. Starting at 94 students in 2015/16, enrollment reached its peak at 118 students in 2020/21. However, there was a gradual decline in subsequent years, with enrollment falling to 98 students by 2023/24.

The number of teachers also varied across the years, ranging between 21 and 30. Teacher numbers peaked at 30 in 2020/21, coinciding with the highest enrollment recorded. The data suggests that teacher availability generally aligns with changes in enrollment, indicating an effort to allocate resources in response to student numbers. However, there are instances of lag in teacher adjustments, such as in 2022/23 when the number of teachers dropped to 21 despite relatively stable student enrollment, possibly due to challenges in recruitment or budgetary constraints.

The pupil/teacher ratio, a critical indicator of individualized attention, fluctuated between 3 and 5 across the period. Ratios of 4 and 5 were the most frequently observed, while a ratio of 3 was recorded only in 2015/16, indicating a year with relatively higher teacher availability compared to total enrollment. Ratios of 5 occurred in 2017/18, 2018/19, 2019/20, and 2022/23.

It is important to note that the data reflects aggregate figures across three schools, and the distribution of teachers and students among these schools is not specified. Variations in student enrollment and teacher allocation at individual schools could significantly impact the pupil/teacher ratio and the quality of support provided. For instance, schools with higher enrollment might experience more pronounced resource constraints, while those with fewer students may achieve better ratios. This highlights the importance of considering the unique circumstances and resource distribution of each school when interpreting these figures.

Overall Enrollment Trends

- There has been a general decline in overall enrollment in special educational needs schools from 112 students in 2015/16 to 98 students in 2023/24 (a decrease of about 12.5%).
 - The most significant decline occurred between 2020/21 and 2021/22, with a reduction of 19 students (from 118 to 99)

Gender Breakdown

- Male enrollment has been higher than female enrollment across all years, with males consistently representing about 60-65% of the total enrollment.
- The largest number of male students was recorded in 2015/16 with 84 males enrolled, while the lowest number of male students occurred in 2021/22 with 62 males.
- Female enrollment has remained significantly lower than male enrollment, although the gap has fluctuated slightly. The number of female students peaked in 2020/21 with 41 females enrolled, and the lowest number occurred in 2015/16 with 28 females.

Trends by Individual School

- School for Children With Special Needs, Georgetown: Enrollment has fluctuated between 14 to 19 males and 2 to 8 females, with the total number of students generally ranging from 18 to 27.
- School for Children With Special Needs, Kingstown: This school consistently had the highest enrollment. The male enrollment ranged from 30 to 47, and female enrollment ranged from 13 to 25, resulting in total enrollment between 54 to 70 students.
 - Sunshine School for Children With Special Needs, Bequia: Enrollment at this school has been relatively steady, with male enrollment ranging from 15 to 20 and female enrollment from 4 to 12, with total enrollment fluctuating between 20 and 32 students.

Year-to-Year Changes

• The most notable drop in enrollment occurred between 2020/21 (118 total students) and 2021/22 (99 total students), where there was a sharp decrease in male students across the schools, particularly at Georgetown and Kingstown.

Changes in Gender Ratio

- The male-to-female ratio has remained relatively consistent over the years. For example, in 2023/24, there were 66 males and 32 females, resulting in a 2:1 male-to-female ratio in the total enrollment.
 - This male-dominated trend has been consistent across all years, though the proportion of female students has slightly increased at certain points (e.g., 2020/21, with 41 females).

Enrollment Decline and Potential Causes

- The overall decline in enrollment in recent years could be attributed to several factors, such as demographic shifts, changes in the population of children with special needs, possible changes in educational policy, or an increase in the availability of alternative forms of support outside the special schools.
 - The slight increase in female enrollment in certain years, such as 2020/21, may suggest an increased focus on gender inclusivity or outreach in special educational services.

Other Observations

- The overall decline in enrollment over the years could point to external factors such as improved integration of special needs students into regular schools or changes in family circumstances, such as migration or relocation.
 - Geographic differences in enrollment (e.g., between Georgetown, Kingstown, and Bequia) could also indicate variations in regional access to special educational resources or population demographics.

Overall Staffing Trends

The total number of teachers across all three schools has fluctuated over the years, but generally, there has been a slight decline in overall staffing. For instance, the total number of teachers across all schools was 29 in 2015/16, and by 2023/24, it decreased to 25.

The highest staffing level was observed in 2020/21 with 30 teachers across the three schools, while the lowest number was recorded in 2022/23 with 21 teachers.

Despite these fluctuations, staffing levels appear to have been relatively stable, with minor variations from year to year.

Trained Teachers

The percentage of trained teachers has shown some fluctuation, but there is a general downward trend in the proportion of trained teachers over the years. For instance, in 2015/16, 62.07% of teachers were trained, but by 2023/24, this had decreased to 48.00%.

The highest percentage of trained teachers was observed in 2017/18 (65.22%), and the lowest percentage was recorded in 2023/24 (48.00%).

This suggests a gradual decline in the proportion of trained teachers, despite some years (such as 2017/18 and 2022/23) where trained teacher percentages rose temporarily.

Insights on Staffing and Training

While staffing levels have not fluctuated drastically, there has been a clear decline in the proportion of trained teachers. This may indicate a potential issue with teacher professional development or retention in special education.

Secondary Education

According to UNESCO, secondary education serves as a crucial stage of learning that builds upon primary education, preparing students for higher education or direct entry into the workforce. It encompasses middle and high school education, as well as vocational or technical training. Secondary education is essential in equipping students with intermediate-level knowledge and skills, bridging the gap between foundational education and the complexities of further learning or the labor market.

This segment of the Education Statistical Digest highlights key data and trends related to secondary education in St. Vincent and the Grenadines. The data spans from the academic year 2002-03 to 2023-24, providing a broad overview of this important educational stage.


In the 2023-24 academic year, 29 institutions provided access to secondary education in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, enrolling a total of 9,318 students. Of these, approximately 50.62% (4,717) were male, and 49.38% (4,601) were female, reflecting a near-equal gender distribution. These schools were staffed by 862 teachers, with nearly 60% (512) of them being formally trained educators. Trained teachers have received specialized pedagogical training and certification to improve educational quality. Furthermore, over 55% (486) of the teaching staff hold at least an undergraduate degree or higher.


The government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines continues to demonstrate its strong commitment to supporting secondary education by allocating \$46,827,791 for the sector in the 2023 budget. This financial investment underscores the government's dedication to providing equitable access to quality education and fostering the development of its citizens.


St. Vincent and the Grenadines has a relatively low dropout rate of 1.67% (156 students) in the 2023-24 academic year. However, it is significant to note that males accounted for more than 60% of the recorded dropouts, highlighting a gender disparity that warrants further attention.

Additionally, 1,211 students were recorded as repeaters in the same academic year, with males representing over 65% (806) of the repeaters. This data points to an area of concern that requires targeted interventions to reduce repetition rates and ensure better educational outcomes.

The government, in collaboration with educational institutions, can benefit from implementing data-driven intervention programs aimed at addressing the challenges of dropouts and repeaters. Research-based solutions are essential for ensuring that all students, regardless of gender, can successfully progress through their secondary education and enter the workforce or higher education pathways.










Enrolment in secondary schools increased steadily from 2002/03, peaking at 11,663 students in 2007/08. Since then, there has been a gradual decline, reaching 9,318 students in 2023/24. This reflects a downward trend in student numbers over the past decade, following the earlier period of growth. The number of schools increased from 21 in 2002/03 to 29 in 2023/24, with periods of stability in between, indicating gradual growth in educational infrastructure. Total expenditure on education has steadily risen from EC\$15.07 million in 2002/03 to EC\$46.83 million in 2023/24, reflecting increased financial investment, driven by factors such as inflation, higher teacher salaries, and rising educational costs. Concurrently, expenditure per pupil has more than doubled from EC\$1,906 in 2002/03 to EC\$5,026 in 2023/24, signifying greater resource allocation per student. The average school size has decreased from 377 students per school in 2002/03 to 321 in 2023/24, while the pupil-to-teacher ratio has significantly improved from 18:1 to 11:1, indicating smaller class sizes and better student-teacher ratios. The average number of teachers per school has increased from 21 to 30, reflecting a growing workforce to support these trends.







The total number of dropouts has fluctuated over the years, with a noticeable decrease from 247 in 2014/15 to 156 in 2023/24, indicating a general downward trend and suggesting improved retention or changes in dropout prevention strategies.

Form-Specific Observations:

- Form 1 dropouts have remained relatively low, with a significant decline from 41 in 2019/20 to 23 in 2023/24.
 Form 2 dropouts peaked at 65 in 2017/18 but have since declined to 41 in 2023/24.
- Form 3 saw the highest dropout rate in 2017/18 (104 dropouts), but this has decreased significantly, reaching 39 in 2023/24.
 - Form 4 fluctuated but peaked in 2019/20 at 79 dropouts, and has since dropped to 48 in 2023/24.
- Form 5 consistently has lower dropout rates, with just 4 dropouts in 2015/16, the lowest in the period. The 2021/22 academic year recorded the lowest total dropouts (91), likely due to disruptions from the volcanic eruptions and COVID-19 pandemic. The highest total dropout rate occurred in 2017/18 (278 dropouts), driven largely by Form 3 and Form 2. In recent years (2020/21 to 2023/24), the number of dropouts has remained lower, reflecting successful interventions or changes in student retention strategies.


Form 3 exhibited the highest dropout rates from 2013/14 to 2017/18, particularly in 2017/18, when 65 male students dropped out. This suggests that Form 3 may be a critical year for retention, possibly due to increased academic pressure or other factors affecting student engagement. However, from 2018/19 onward, Forms 2 and 4 took the lead in dropout rates.. The years 2017/18 and 2019/20 recorded the highest total male dropouts, with 172 and 160, respectively, driven by high dropout rates in Forms 2, Forms 3 and 4. These patterns suggest that these forms could be critical points for male students, likely influenced by academic challenges and other factors.



The years 2014/15 and 2017/18 saw the highest female dropout rates, with 114 and 106 dropouts, respectively, primarily occurring in Forms 3 and 4. This indicates that these forms may represent critical points for female students, potentially due to academic or social challenges. Specifically, Forms 3 and 4 consistently exhibit higher dropout rates, with Form 3 reaching a peak of 41 dropouts in 2014/15, and Form 4 peaking at 36 dropouts in both 2016/17 and 2019/20. These trends suggest that these years may be pivotal for student retention, influenced by academic pressure or other factors affecting student engagement



The total number of repeaters fluctuated over the years, peaking at 1,524 in 2017/18 and dropping to a low of 132 in 2020/21, likely due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and school closures. Since the peak, the number of repeaters has generally declined, from 1,524 in 2017/18 to 1,211 in 2023/24, indicating improvements in student retention, possibly as a result of enhanced academic support or changes in educational strategies.

Form-Specific Observations:

- Form 1: The number of repeaters in Form 1 shows a peak in 2015/16 (370 repeaters) but has fluctuated over time, reaching 360 in 2023/24.
 - Form 2: Repeaters in Form 2 have fluctuated significantly, peaking at 410 in 2017/18 and decreasing to 248 in 2023/24. The decline may suggest improvements in addressing retention at this stage.
 - Form 3: This form consistently shows a high number of repeaters, with a peak in 2019/20 (458 repeaters).
- Form 4: Repeaters in Form 4 showed a gradual decline, from 326 in 2013/14 to 207 in 2023/24. However, there is a noticeable dip in 2020/21, possibly due to disruptions from the pandemic.



Form-Specific Observations:

Form 1: The number of repeaters in Form 1 has fluctuated, with a peak of 277 in 2015/16, dropping significantly to 35 in 2020/21. The figure has since risen again to 265 in 2023/24, indicating varying trends in first-year retention.

Form 2: Repeaters in Form 2 show considerable fluctuation, peaking at 304 in 2017/18 and decreasing to 174 in 2023/24, suggesting a decline in repeaters over time.

Form 3: Form 3 consistently shows a relatively high number of repeaters, with fluctuations but remaining substantial, peaking in 2017/18 at 269 and then stabilizing at 238 in 2023/24.

Form 4: Repeaters in Form 4 have generally decreased over time, from 185 in 2013/14 to 118 in 2023/24, suggesting improved retention or fewer students needing to repeat this year.

Form 5: Repeaters in Form 5 have consistently been the lowest, with the number dropping significantly from 45 in 2017/18 to just 11 in 2023/24, reflecting a decrease in repeaters during the final year of secondary school.



The analysis of the data from the period 2013/14 to 2023/24 reveals some notable trends in the number of female repeaters across various forms. Form 3 recorded the highest total number of female repeaters, with 1,266 instances of repetition over the period. This was followed by Form 4, which had 1,116 repeaters. The consistent higher rates of repetition in these forms suggest that there may be gender-specific challenges that hinder female students' progression at these particular levels. This warrants further research to better understand the underlying causes of these challenges and identify possible interventions.

In contrast, Form 5, which represents the final year of secondary education, consistently recorded the lowest number of repeaters, significantly lower than Forms 1 through 4. This lower repetition rate could indicate that students in Form 5 are generally more prepared for this advanced level of secondary education. It may also reflect their readiness to sit for the Caribbean Secondary Education Certificate (CSEC) examinations. A closer examination of the CSEC results could provide additional insights into this pattern, potentially revealing correlations between repetition rates and students' academic performance. These findings could inform future educational strategies aimed at reducing repetition rates and improving student outcomes.



- The repetition rate peaked at 15.07% in 2017/18, coinciding with the highest number of repeaters (1,524). This suggests a relatively high level of academic challenges or systemic issues during that period.
- The repetition rate dropped sharply to 1.41% in 2020/21, which is likely due to the pandemic's effects, as the number of repeaters was drastically reduced to just 132, despite the relatively stable enrolment.
- The sharp drop in repeaters in 2020/21 and the drastic reduction in repetition rate (1.41%) strongly suggest that the pandemic affected the education system, possibly due to school closures, changes in exam formats, or other interventions that influenced academic progression.
- In general, there appears to be a negative correlation between total enrolment and repetition rate—as enrolment decreased over the years, the repetition rate fluctuated but remained relatively high until the pandemic year.



The Overall Grade Enrolment Ratio refers to the total number of pupils in each form (Form 1 to Form 5), regardless of whether they are under-aged, class-aged, or over-aged. This number is expressed as a proportion of the population corresponding to the typical age range for each class (12 to 16 years old).

- Overall Grade Enrolment Ratio (OGER):
- The OGER is consistently over 100% for Forms 1 to 3, peaking at 110.22% in Form 2. This suggests that enrolment exceeds the population of the typical age group, indicating the presence of under-aged or overaged students.
- In Forms 4 and 5, the ratio declines to 89.18 % and 71.74 %, respectively, reflecting a drop in enrolment relative to the population.
 - Age Distribution Across Forms:
- Under-aged students are more prevalent in lower forms, with 29.49% in Form 1, gradually decreasing to 22.79% in Form 5. The presence of under-aged students might reflect early school entry or acceleration for high-performing students.
 - Class-aged students peak in Form 1 (44.14 %) and then decline to 41.38 % in Form 5.
 - Over-aged students increase steadily from 26.36 % in Form 1 to 35.83 % in Form 5, suggesting retention issues or late school entry.

Enrolment Decline in Higher Forms:

- Total enrolment decreases from 2,075 in Form 1 to 1,404 in Form 5.
- This could indicate student dropouts, grade repetition, or transitions to alternative education or employment.

The data from the 2023/24 academic year reveals a consistent decline in both total enrolment and the Age Specific Enrolment Ratio (ASER) from lower forms to higher forms. Beginning with Form 1, the total enrolment stands at 916 students, but by Form 5, this figure drops significantly to 581.

This trend is also evident in the ASER scores. In Form 1, the overall ASER is 48.28 %, indicating that nearly half of the students of the appropriate age for that grade are enrolled. However, as students advance to Form 5, the ASER declines to 29.69 %, signaling a marked decrease in age-appropriate enrolment in the upper forms.

Gender disparities in enrolment also emerge clearly in the data. While males show a marginally higher ASER than females in Form 1, at 49.03% compared to 47.48%, this pattern reverses as students progress. From Form 2 onward, females consistently outperform males in age-appropriate enrolment. For instance, in Form 3, 50.89% of females are enrolled, compared to only 42.17% of males. By the time students reach Form 5, the female ASER stands at 30.49%, surpassing the male ASER of 28.90%.

The majority of students fall within the age range of 12 to 16, which aligns with the typical age for secondary school attendance. Overall, male students (4,717) slightly outnumber female students (4,601), but the difference is minimal, reflecting near gender parity in the system.

In the earlier forms, particularly Forms 1 and 2, male enrollment is higher than female enrollment. This trend continues into Form 3 but reverses in Form 4, where female students (920) outnumber male students (780). By Form 5, enrollment numbers decline significantly for both genders, though males still slightly outnumber females.

The data highlights that the largest number of students is in Form 1, with a total enrollment of 2,075, while Form 5 has the smallest number of students, with only 1,404 enrolled. This pattern may indicate a decline in enrollment as students progress to higher forms, likely due to various factors such as dropouts or transitions to other education or vocational pathways.



o In 2001/02, graduate teachers made up 38.48% of the teaching workforce.

Table 116 presents data on the percentage share of untrained graduate teachers in secondary schools from the academic year 2001/02 to 2023/24. Over this period, there has been a general increase in the total number of graduate teachers, rising from 162 in 2001/02 to 486 in 2023/24. Similarly, the number of trained graduate teachers steadily increased from 103 in 2001/02 to 322 in 2023/24.

In contrast, the absolute number of untrained graduate teachers also increased, moving from 59 in 2001/02 to 164 in 2023/24. This rise is directly related to the overall growth in the total number of graduate teachers during this period.

Despite the increase in the absolute number of untrained graduate teachers, the percentage share of untrained graduate teachers generally declined over the years. The percentage was recorded at 36.42% in 2001/02 and peaked at 58.58% in 2003/04. Following this peak, the percentage began to decrease, reaching 33.74% by 2023/24.

Between 2018/19 and 2023/24, the percentage of untrained graduate teachers generally declined from 40.34% to 33.74%, despite minor increases in some years. This overall decrease suggests progress in increasing the proportion of trained teachers in the secondary school system.

The total number of male graduate teachers exhibited a steady and substantial increase, doubling from 65 in 2001/02 to 131 in 2023/24, representing a 101.5% growth over the 22-year period.

During the initial phase, the percentage of untrained male graduate teachers fluctuated. Starting at 32.31% in 2001/02, it rose to 40.54% by 2005/06. This period reflects some instability in the balance between trained and untrained teachers, with occasional increases despite the modest growth in total teacher numbers.

A significant spike occurred in 2007/08, where the proportion of untrained male graduate teachers surged to 55.84%, the highest across the entire dataset. This increase suggests challenges in providing or obtaining teacher training during that time. From 2007/08 to 2009/10, the percentage remained high, above 50%, before slightly declining to 47.56% in 2011/12. However, it climbed again in 2012/13 (53.54%) and 2013/14 (52.04%), indicating persistent difficulties in reducing the number of untrained teachers. There was fluctuation between 2013/14 and 2015/16.

The most promising trends appear in the recent years, where a steady decline in the percentage of untrained male graduate teachers is evident. The figures consistently dropped from 50.00% in 2016/17 to 42.14 % in 2019/20 before rising again to 46.15 % in 2020/21, after which it decreased to 36.64 % in the following year, then increased until 2023/24 (38.93 %).

Despite this generally positive trend, the total number of male graduate teachers continued to rise steadily, reaching 131 in 2023/24. Importantly, while the absolute number of untrained teachers remained relatively high (51 in 2023/24), the proportion relative to the total teacher population decreased from earlier years, signaling progress in addressing male teacher qualification gaps.



The percentage of untrained female graduate teachers fluctuated notably throughout the period. In the early years (2001/02–2005/06), the percentage rose modestly from 39.18% in 2001/02 to 40.40% in 2002/03. However, a sharp spike occurred in 2003/04 when the percentage soared to 65.09%, the highest recorded during the entire period. This increase was primarily due to a significant drop in the number of trained teachers—from 59 in 2002/03 to 37 in 2003/04—while the number of untrained teachers surged from 40 to 69. By 2005/06, the proportion of untrained female graduate teachers had decreased to 47.29%, signaling some progress in addressing training gaps. Nonetheless, the figure remained relatively high.

Between 2007/08 and 2015/16, the proportion of untrained female graduate teachers displayed a gradual but inconsistent decline. In 2007/08, the rate stood at 49.30%, followed by a slight increase to 51.74% in 2009/10. However, by 2011/12, notable progress was evident as the percentage dropped to 35.65%. Despite this improvement, fluctuations persisted, with the proportion ranging between 38% and 43% through 2015/16. These shifts suggest that while efforts were being made to improve teacher qualifications, occasional reversals may have been influenced by staffing demands or limited training resources.

The most recent years have shown more consistent progress. The percentage of untrained female graduate teachers steadily declined from 35.41% in 2016/17 to a low of 27.69% in 2021/22—the lowest in the dataset. Although there was a slight uptick to 31.83% in 2023/24, the overall trend reflects sustained improvement in teacher training access. Notably, this progress occurred alongside significant workforce expansion, with the total number of female graduate teachers increasing by 98 between 2016/17 and 2023/24. This indicates more effective alignment between recruitment and professional training.



[•] Total expenditure has steadily increased from EC\$15.7 million in 2003/04 to EC\$46.8 million in 2023/24, driven by rising unit expenditure and shifts in enrolment. Notably, total expenditure grew sharply between 2003/04 and 2009/10, more than doubling from EC\$15.7 million to EC\$36.6 million. From 2010/11 to 2023/24, expenditure grew more gradually but consistently, rising by EC\$10.1 million from EC\$36.7 million to EC\$46.8 million.

[•] Despite a decline in enrolment by approximately 1,311 students, unit expenditure per pupil has increased significantly, leading to higher total expenditure. This suggests that per-student funding has risen, likely due to inflation, policy changes, or adjustments in resource allocation. The sharp increase in unit expenditure from 2007/08 onward likely reflects both inflation and increased investment in education to improve quality, support higher teacher salaries, and address rising educational costs, all while maintaining or enhancing standards.



The Caribbean Certificate of Secondary Level Competence (CCSLC) is a secondary-level qualification developed by the Caribbean Examinations Council (CXC). It has been offered in the Caribbean region since 2007, catering to both secondary school students and adult learners.

Performance Trends:

The percentage of students achieving the Master level is low across subjects, with an overall average of 8.46%. This suggests that few students are excelling, indicating challenges in achieving higher proficiency. In contrast, a larger proportion of students are performing at the Competent level, with an average of 55.38%, reflecting that most students meet basic proficiency (scores between 50-74). However, 36.15% of students are in the Developing Competence category, suggesting that many students have not yet reached proficiency and may need additional support.

Subject-Specific Observations:

- In English, of the 22 students, 1 achieved the Master level, 14 were Competent, and 7 were in the Developing Competence category. While many students performed well, a notable proportion still struggled to meet proficiency standards.
- In Integrated Science, out of 12 students, only 2 were Competent, and 10 were in the Developing Competence category, indicating a significant challenge in this subject.
- In Mathematics, 8 students achieved Master, 39 were Competent, and 22 were in the Developing Competence category. Although the distribution is more balanced, a substantial number of students are still performing below expectations.
- In Social Studies, of 19 students, 2 reached Master and 17 were Competent, with no students in the Developing Competence category, highlighting strong overall performance.
 - In Spanish, all 8 students fell into the Developing Competence category, with none reaching the Competent level, indicating significant challenges in this subject.

A total of 130 students participated in the CCSLC examinations in 2024, representing five schools. Among these, the largest cohort came from West St George Secondary School, with 86 students, while the lowest cohort sitting was from St. Josephs' Convent Kingstown with 3 students.

The table categorizes student performance into three levels of achievement: Master, Competent, and Developing Competence Level. Out of the total students:

- 11 students (8.5%) achieved the Master level.
- 72 students (55.4%) achieved the Competent level.
- 47 students (36.2%) fell into the Developing Competence Level category.

High Performers (Master Level)

The Master level saw the highest representation from St Martin's Secondary School, where 6 out of 10 students attained this distinction. This reflects a strong performance relative to the school's number of participants, showcasing its excellence in preparing students for the examination.

Competent Level Dominance

The majority of students achieved the Competent level, with significant contributions from West St George Secondary School, which accounted for 51 of the 72 students at this level. George Stephens Sr Secondary School also performed well, with 11 of its 13 students reaching this category.

Developing Competence Level

Despite its strong showing in the Competent level, West St George Secondary School also had the highest number of students—33—classified in the Developing Competence Level, reflecting a substantial percentage of underperforming students within its large cohort. Similarly, St Joseph's Convent Marriaqua had 12 out of its 14 students (85.7%) in this category, representing a significant challenge in terms of student performance. These results suggest the need for targeted interventions, particularly for schools with high proportions of students in the Developing Competence Level, to improve outcomes and support students in achieving higher competency levels.



Technical and vocational education and training (TVET)

According to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESC), "Technical and vocational education and training' (TVET) is understood as comprising education, training and skills development relating to a wide range of occupational fields, production, services and livelihoods. TVET, as part of lifelong learning, can take place at secondary, post-secondary and tertiary levels and includes work-based learning and continuing training and professional development which may lead to qualifications."

The Government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines (GOSVG) and the Ministry of Education in SVG are continuing to make strides in ensuring that TVET programs are more accessible and acknowledged as essential education-related training that can significantly improve a student's capacity to be an eminently productive member of SVG and the Caribbean community.

TVET programs are predominantly offered via four (4) technical institutions (Barrouallie, Campden Park, Georgetown, and Kingstown Technical Institutes) with a vision to increase TVET programs and facilities. Due to governmental and ministry initiatives, there has been a 70% increase in enrolment (an increase of 174 students) for the academic year 2023/24, which had 422 students enrolled when compared to the previous 2022/23 academic year (248 students). This positive upward change in enrolment can be mostly attributed to the following:

- Increased enrolment at the Barrouallie Technical Institute (BTI) from 97 students in 2022/23 to 205 students (a 111.34% increase) in 2023/24.
 - The BTI continued its trend of enrolling the largest number of students. In 2023/24, BTI's enrolment represents 48.5% of the enrolled students for the academic period of 2023/24.
- Increased enrolment at the Campden Park Technical Institute (CPTI) from 55 students in 2022/23 to 107 students (a 94.5% increase) in 2023/24.
- Increased female enrolment across the four (4) technical institutes from 100 female students in 2022/23 to 199 female students (a 99% increase) in 2023/24.
 - 11 Females (compared to 1 in 2022/23) enrolled in the electrical installation program in 2023/24,
 thus indicating that greater access and opportunities are being provided for our females.
- Increased male enrolment across technical institutes from 148 male students in 2022/23 to 223 male students (a 50.6% increase) in 2023/24.

TVET is definitely headed in a positive direction as the government continues its collaborative, consultative, and financial drive to remain a TVET trailblazer in the Organization of the Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) with a vision to rival the Caribbean Community's TVET powerhouses.





The total number of CSEC candidates has shown a slight decline from 1,508 in 2015 to 1,477 in 2024, with fluctuations in the number of candidates sitting at least one TVET subject. However, the decline in total candidates does not directly correlate with TVET participation. Although the number of male candidates are lower than that of their female counterparts, males consistently show higher participation in TVET subjects than females. In 2015, 93.7% of males participated compared to 91.7% of females, and by 2024, 93.9% of males and 86.8% of females participated. TVET participation dropped dramatically in 2020 possibly due to the COVID-19 pandemic, falling to 53.6%, but recovered in 2021, reaching 89.7%. From 2021 to 2024, participation stabilized, averaging between 90% and 92%, although female participation showed a gradual decline, from 91.7% in 2015 to 86.8% in 2024. While male participation has remained relatively stable, the gap between male and female participation in TVET subjects has widened in recent years. Overall, TVET participation remained high throughout the period, with 2020 being the only significant outlier.


From 2015 to 2024, pass rates for candidates sitting at least one TVET subject in the CSEC exams remained generally high. The highest pass rate was recorded in 2017, at 97.2%, while the lowest occurred in 2020, at 76.2%. This decline in 2020 likely correlates with the disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, which may have affected both performance and participation rates during that year.

Both male and female candidates showed consistent high pass rates, although 2020 marked the year with the lowest pass rates for both genders. Specifically, male candidates recorded their lowest pass rate of 74.9%, while female candidates had their lowest pass rate at 77.6%.

Over the entire period, females generally outperformed their male counterparts, achieving higher pass rates in most years. However, there were exceptions in 2016 and 2023, when males had slightly higher pass rates than females.


There is a noticeable decline in the percentage of CSEC candidates sitting at least two TVET subjects over time. In 2015, 62.6% of all candidates sat at least two TVET subjects, but by 2024, this percentage had dropped to 59.0%. The decline is particularly evident after 2017, with 2018 seeing a significant drop to 56.8%.

While the trend is generally downward, there are some fluctuations. For example, participation increased in 2020 (60.7%) and 2023 (58.0%), compared to 2019 (49.9%) and 2022 (55.2%).

Male candidates have consistently had lower participation rates in at least two TVET subjects than females. In 2015, 61.3% of males participated, compared to 63.6% of females. This trend continues throughout the years, with males consistently lagging behind. By 2024, 58.6% of males participated, compared to 59.4% of females.

The passing rate for candidates sitting at least two TVET subjects has shown variability, but the trend appears more stable compared to participation. In 2015, the overall passing rate was 84.7%, which increased over the next few years, peaking at 100% in 2021. By 2024, the passing rate had slightly decreased to 82.6%. Female candidates consistently outperform male candidates in passing rates for at least two TVET subjects. In 2015, 88.3% of female candidates passed compared to 79.9% of males. This trend continues throughout the years, with females maintaining a higher passing rate in each year, although the gap has narrowed over time. By 2024, 84.3% of females passed, while 80.5% of males passed.

The gap between male and female passing rates, which was more pronounced in earlier years, has narrowed. For instance, in 2017, the female passing rate was 93.0%, while the male passing rate was 90.2%. In 2024, the gap narrowed to just 3.8 percentage points, with 84.3% of females passing and 80.5% of males passing.

Even as the number of candidates sitting at least two TVET subjects declined, the passing rate for these subjects remained relatively stable. For instance, the total number of candidates sitting at least two TVET subjects decreased from 944 in 2015 to 872 in 2024, but the passing rate only saw a slight decline from 84.7% to 82.6% over the same period.

Tertiary Education

This segment of the Education Statistical Digest presents data and insights on post-secondary education in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, highlighting key trends in enrollment, program offerings, and student performance for the 2023-24 academic year. Post-secondary education plays a crucial role in equipping students with the skills and qualifications needed for professional advancement, higher education, and workforce readiness.

The St. Vincent and the Grenadines Community College (SVGCC) continues to be the principal provider of post-secondary education, offering programs in Arts, Sciences & General Studies, Technical & Vocational Education, Teacher Education, and Nursing Education. For the 2023-24 academic year, 2,040 students were enrolled across the four divisions of the college. While enrollment remains strong, gender disparities persist, with 707 (34.66%) males and 1,333 (65.34%) females, reflecting trends seen in previous years where female students outnumber their male counterparts in post-secondary education.

Beyond SVGCC, Vincentian students also pursue studies at regional and international institutions, with a notable number enrolled at the University of the West Indies (UWI). In 2023-24, a total of 304 Vincentian students were registered at the UWI St. Augustine and Mona Campuses, with female enrollment continuing to surpass that of males. In addition, at the local-based UWI Open Campus, there were 1,086 students enrolled for the 2023-24 academic period.

Performance on the Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Examination (CAPE) serves as an indicator of student readiness for post-secondary education. In 2023-24, the overall CAPE pass rate stood at 96.39% for Unit 1 Subjects and 95.90% for Unit 2 Subjects, reinforcing the continued efforts to maintain high academic standards.

A strong commitment to supporting post-secondary education is reflected in the government's expenditure of \$20,308,921 for Post-Secondary and Higher Education in the 2023-24 academic year. This financial investment underscores the dedication to providing equitable access to quality post-secondary education and fostering the development of its citizens.

To recognize outstanding academic achievement, a record-breaking 104 students were honored during the National Schools' Independence Rally for their exceptional performance at SVGCC. Among them:

- 32 students received National Scholarships, each covering five years of study at the University of the West Indies (UWI).
- 21 students received Exhibition Scholarships, each covering three years at UWI.
- 49 students were awarded bursaries valued at \$25,000 EC per year for three years.
- 2 Special Awards were granted to students over 21 years old who demonstrated exceptional academic excellence.

To further strengthen this sector, continued financial investments, scholarship programs, and expanded training opportunities remain central priorities. Ensuring greater male participation, enhancing technical and vocational education, and improving access to tertiary education are key areas of focus for policymakers and educators alike.



From 2008/09 to 2023/24, female enrollment has consistently been significantly higher than that of their male counterparts. This gender disparity may reflect and reinforce broader societal and cultural norms, suggesting that males may be facing challenges in achieving higher levels of educational attainment. To address this gap, further investigation and research are needed to better understand the factors contributing to lower male enrollment in tertiary education.



The highest recorded pass rate of 100.00% was achieved in 2004, a year in which every candidate passed. In contrast, the lowest pass rate was observed in 2006, at 69.17%, followed by 72.66% in 2005. After these years, pass rates began to improve gradually.

Since then, pass rates have remained high, with 2023 and 2024 marking exceptional pass rates of 95.73% and 96.19%, respectively.

The peak number of subject sittings occurred in 2012, with 2,174 subjects recorded. In that same year, the highest absolute number of subject passes was also achieved, with 1,839 passes, corresponding to a pass rate of 84.59%.

After the low pass rates of 2005 and 2006, pass rates improved significantly. By 2007, the pass rate had risen to 88.69%, and it has consistently remained above 80% since then.



Library Services

Library services in St. Vincent and the Grenadines have been established since 1893, evolving into a comprehensive network managed by the National Public Library, Archives, and Documentation Services. The network comprises twenty-four (24) libraries, including a National Archives and Documentation Centre. The main library, located in Kingstown, is supplemented by twenty-three (23) branch libraries distributed across the country.

Documentation Centre and National Archives

The Documentation Centre, established in 1982, serves as a crucial repository of social and economic information sourced from government documents, policymakers, the public, the private sector, and researchers. In 1990, the National Archives was established to collect, organize, preserve, and store records and documents pertaining to the history of St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

Programs and Services

The library system offers diverse programs and services catering to academic, recreational, and research needs. Current offerings include:

- Audio book service for the print disabled
- Access to EBSCO host databases
- Online Story time
- After School Programme (Remedial Reading, Math, Language Arts)
- Access to eBooks
- Library Caravan (outreach service)
- Book Club
- Storytelling for preschoolers
- Literacy programmes
- Homework Club
- HYPE (Helping Young People Excel) programme, held during the July-August vacation for children ages 11-15 years (exclusive to the National Public Library)
- CLAP for Fun Programme, held during the July-August vacation for children 5-12 years at the National Public Library and fifteen (15) branch libraries.

Technology and Connectivity

The library system provides modern technological infrastructure to enhance access and usability:

- Two computer rooms with internet service
- Wi-Fi availability at the National Public Library, National Archives and Documentation Centre, and all branch libraries
- Website, Facebook, and Instagram platforms for information dissemination and event updates

Library Management Software

The information management system, Alexandria, has been implemented at the National Public Library, Calliaqua Branch Library, Georgetown Branch Library, and Rose Hall Branch Library. Recently updated to a web-based version, Alexandria enables online catalogue search and personal library account access. Other branch libraries continue to use the manual Brown System for book issuing.
